Attendance Policy: In the May term, missing one class is the equivalent of missing an entire week in fall or spring semester. Further, although writing is often a solitary pursuit, this course is not. Thorough preparation for every class, focused involvement in discussions, mutual support and constructive criticism are not only encouraged; they are required. Please be aware that participation constitutes 25% of your final grade. **Only legitimate concerns will constitute an excused absence. Do not miss this class**.

Course Requirements:

(This is a Writing Intensive course. Every three-hour class meeting in a May term course offers content equal to that delivered in a week of class during fall or spring semester. Also, this is your only class during May. Therefore, you will be writing every day, in and out of the classroom.)

Short Screenplay: Each student will conceive, develop, and craft an original, 6-8-page screenplay, inspired by a selected myth, folk tale, or fairy tale, which will be submitted in "second-draft" form, at the final exam, (Friday, 6/2).

Featurette: Each student will conceive, develop and craft an original 20-30 page, dramatic, fictional screenplay, which will be submitted in "second-draft" form, at the final exam, (Friday, 6/2).

Meetings: During the last week of the term, each student must arrange and attend one, 60-minute meeting with the instructor, outside of class, to discuss the development of their screenplays.

Collaboration/Mutual Support: All students must participate as staged-reading actors for in-class readings of classmates' screenplays. Each student must provide electronic copies, (via Google Docs or Celtx) of their scripts for everyone in the class on days they will be read.

Journals: Each student will keep a journal/portfolio of all writings generated for this class, in a Google Doc, which will be shared with the instructor. It will be "collected" at the Final Exam, (Friday, 6/2). It will be comprised of several types of entries.

-All typed exercises, assignments, and notes generated in and for this class.
All typed notes and/or commentary on any/all aspects of this class
-Typed notes on screenplay development
-Short Screenplay (In Celtx Studio)
-Featurette Screenplay (In Celtx Studio)

(Any/All HAND WRITTEN JOURNAL CONTENT should be kept in a binder and must be submitted at the final exam -Thursday, 5/27)
